



Island of the Month

P2—Papua New Guinea. Far away and on the other side of the equator is a land so different from ours, that many refuse to believe people still live as the natives do here. Papua New Guinea is half of the island of New Guinea (the other half belonging to Indonesia) with valleys undiscovered by modern man, with people who still live by the rules of the jungle and



who don't mingle with tourists or other tribes. Where volcanoes still erupt and destroy towns, and where there can still be found new species of animals and fish. The towns and sub-islands are known to historians: Port Moresby, Madang, and Bougainville. The first explorers were the Portuguese, followed by the Dutch in 1512. The Japanese fought to keep the island during WWII, but the Allies simply bypassed the island and blockaded it from homeland support and proceeded to move on towards the Japanese mainland. Over 3000 species of orchids, butterflies so large they are mistaken for birds, and animals not seen elsewhere in the world.

Lying just north of the northwest part of Australia, at approximately 6° S/147°W, the group of islands lies at the convergence of the Coral Sea, the Solomon Sea, and the South Pacific. The eastern part of the island has been under the control of the Germans, the English and lastly the Australians. Gaining independence in 1975, civil unrest led to a 9-year secessionist revolt on the island of Bougainville lasting until 1997 that claimed the lives of approximately 20,000 people. The islands have such diversity you can find modern medical facilities and not far away in newly discovered valleys, tribes that have never had contact with modern conveniences. There are reportedly several very nice golf courses as well as areas to hike that take you

completely away from humanity. The land varies from seaside/sea level, to the peak of Mount Wilhelm at 4509 meters. They are subject to frequent and sometimes severe earthquakes, tsunamis, and mud slides. One of the world's largest swamps occupies the southwest coast, and volcanic activity keeps many areas under eruption watches. The population was reported to be 5.5 million in 2005, with a median age of 21. Life expectancy in this tropical paradise is 63 for men and 67 for women. Infant mortality is at about 5%. Diseases endemic to the area are dengue fever, malaria, and food- and waterborne diseases such as bacterial and protozoan diarrhea and hepatitis A and typhoid fever. The legal system is based on English law, and although independent, the Chief of State is Queen Elizabeth, with a Governor General as her representative. This type of government is considered a Constitutional Monarchy with Parliamentary Democracy. The capital is Port Moresby (okay movie fans who starred in '30s and '40s movies based out of here?)

The country is richly endowed in minerals, envied around the world, the major problem being the excavation of same. With poor road structures, earthquakes that move structures, hurricanes, and the high cost of developing the infrastructure to get them to ports, the country is still a poor nation. Agriculture provides 85% of the livelihoods of the populace. Copper, oil, and gold all account for 72% of the island's exports. Australia, as the prior major controlling power, provides \$240 million in aid to the country. Exports include oil, gold, copper ore, logs, palm oil, coffee, cocoa, crawfish and prawns. Imports are machinery, transport equipment, manufactured goods, food, fish, fuels and chemicals. As a measure of advancements,

of the 5.5 million population, there are only 75,000 Internet users. Paved roads were far behind unpaved with only 3% of roads being paved. But there are 550 unpaved airports and 21 paved and 2 heliports. There is no main national language, with over 800 different dialects spoken. Ham radio contacts are provided mostly by visiting hams.


